CHILD PROTECTION PROCEDURES

- All staff have been subject to appropriate criminal background checks.
- All staff have adopted the YMCA's 'Code of practice' for adults working with young people, which outlines expected and appropriate behaviour towards our young people.
- All staff are required to undertake appropriate child protection training at regular intervals
- All staff are aware of procedures for reporting suspected or disclosed abuse
- All staff are aware of Health & Safety Procedures

CONFIDENTIALITY



- The requirement to protect children ultimately outweighs any duty to confidentiality.
- No guarantee of confidentiality can be given to the child or staff member.
- Failure to disclose relevant information about an alleged crime is an offence in itself.
- Any information provided will only be disclosed where it is in the best interests of the child to do so and on a NEED TO KNOW BASIS.
- All records, information and confidential notes will be kept securely according to best practice data protection guidelines
